Acknowledgement of Country

From time immemorial the Wurundjeri people have cared for this land, nurtured it, depended on it and given honour and thanks to the Creator. Readings

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, 'Let there be light'; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

- 1 Ascribe to the Lord, you powers of heaven, ascribe to the Lord glory and strength.

The second reading is from the Acts of the Apostles 19. 1-7;

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the inland regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?' They replied, 'No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.' Then he said, 'Into what then were you baptized?' They answered, 'Into John's baptism.' Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus. On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them.

the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied – altogether there were about twelve of them.

Hear the Word of the Lord Thanks be to God

The Lord be with you; and also with you The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark 1. 4-11; Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.' In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

Faith Matters!! Diving Deeper into the Baptism of our Lord.

Today we read about the Baptism of Jesus. The word Messiah or Christ literally means the anointed one. In today's gospel reading, we witness the Jesus' anointing as the Messiah through baptism; God declares it as such. Being anointed usually means being anointed into a greater role. For example, David the shepherd was anointed by Samuel into taking on his role as a great king. Yet the anointing Jesus receives brings him into the missional role of the suffering servant, the one who suffers for all and is the way through which all sins are atoned for all time.

Jesus' baptism is a declaration of power and consecration for mission. The mission being death on the cross and conquering death through his resurrection so that all who believe in Him may have life. Whilst Jesus was sinless and was not baptised as repentance for his sins, He still gave up something in order to do the Father's will. Jesus repented from his divinity and his claim to heaven while His mission of redemption was in place. Until his return to heaven, the gospels show that Jesus did not rely on his divine nature in order to prevent the mission of the Father from being fulfilled. Yes he taught people about God with the authority of the Word of God, and healed people with the power of heaven, but Jesus was baptised into our humanity to live the way we live, to feel the suffering we feel and to lay his life down for all that hate him and did evil things to Him. He did not rely on His place in the Godhead to change the course of his death, resurrection and ascension into heaven as the Father willed

Hence as we reflect on the Lord's baptism, there are clearly implications for us. Our baptism baptises us into the body of Christ and calls us into the mission of releasing God's love into the world as God wills it, not as we will it. Our repentance is from the sin that comes from living of the fruit of the knowledge of good and evil. Whilst the manifestation of this fruit is wide and varied, we are called to repent from doing things in our own wisdom into seeking God's wisdom and perspective; we are called to repent from deciding on what to do by our own thoughts and allowing God's promptings to lead us; we are called not to do things in our own power but to do the promptings on our hearts with the power of heaven behind us. In repenting we are drawn into sharing the gospel message of how the death and resurrection of Jesus brings spiritual life to all and how the Word of God wants it done, not how we want it done.

Our baptism is not the end of a journey. It is the beginning our our personal calling and mission as baptism releases the mission of the Father into our hearts and calls us to live that mission into the world. By the power of the Holy Spirit we too can teach the gospel, heal the sick and forgive others. Even as we do this, we have a mission that God wants us to do and this is where, like Jesus did, we need to empty ourselves of all the things that would stop us from doing the Father's mission. Jesus exemplified a conscious commitment to the Father's will and so we are required to do the same. As John's baptism anointed Jesus into the role of the suffering servant, we are anointed into the role of being the face, hands and feet of Christ in the world and sharing the gospel of life so that all might be part of the kingdom of God. Embrace your anointing just as Jesus embraced his. This conscious embracing of the will of the Father is what makes us part of the body of Christ. Blessings, Rev. Rob.
