The second reading is from the letter of Paul to the Romans 13. 1-8;

Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God. Therefore whoever resists authority resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgement. For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Do you wish to have no fear of the authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive its approval; for it is God's servant for your good. But if you do what is wrong, you should be afraid, for the authority does not bear the sword in vain! It is the servant of God to execute wrath on the wrongdoer. Therefore one must be subject, not only because of wrath but also because of conscience. For the same reason you also pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, busy with this very thing. Pay to all what is due to them—taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honour to whom honour is due. Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law

Hear the Word of the Lord Thanks be to God

The Lord be with you; and also with you

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark 12. 13-17; Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

Then they sent to him some Pharisees and some Herodians to trap him in what he said. And they came and said to him, 'Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality, but teach the way of God in accordance with truth. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not? Should we pay them, or should we not?' But knowing their hypocrisy, he said to them, 'Why are you putting me to the test? Bring me a denarius and let me see it.' And they brought one. Then he said to them, 'Whose head is this, and whose title?' They answered, 'The emperor's.' Jesus said to them, 'Give to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's.' And they were utterly amazed at him.

Faith Matters: Today as we celebrate the Australia Day, let us congratulate ourselves for what we have come about to be as Australians. We celebrate the God-given bounties in nature, the sky and the seas, the land and the forests; and we thank God for the fruits of the trees and the birds in the air; for the enormous strength provided to the people of this land – the Aboriginal and Torres Strait islanders, migrants and refugees, young and old, we celebrate all of their hard labour of love in making Australia a land of opportunities for all. Our experiences of life and the growth in our self-understanding exhibit a beautiful blend as to who and how we are formed inherently as a diverse, multicultural society, constantly in the making, becoming, and evolving.

Australia day also comes with a reminder that all the blessings are from God who cares and nurtures. Being the God of the whole of the creation, God expects that we follow his commands of loving, caring, and serving one another. We however have always disobeyed God by not honouring his commandment to follow the law of love; instead have selectively applied the rules of life that will benefit the hierarchy and those in power. St. Paul's exhortation in Romans 13 is one of such many misinterpreted texts that solemnise the authorities and their actions even-though they be life-denying. Such a misinterpretation justifies the unjust act in the past. We need to re-read it in the light of the overall teachings of Paul, who in Ch. 12 calls us to live the new Life in Christ and exhorts us not to confirm with this world but to be transformed and willingly receive the new vision of life that is sustaining, to adhere to what is good, acceptable, and perfect in Christ. Then he makes us realise the inherent diversity of nature and functions we are created in and to reflect on the true marks of a Christian as loving, honouring others, ardent in Spirit, serving in nature, rejoicing in hope and patient in suffering, associating with the those who are denied of their rightful honour and dignity in the land, and calling all to live in Peace. As for the authorities, structures and principalities we should read Romans 13 together with Paul's own encouragement in Ephesians 6:10 following, to be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power and know that our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh but against the rulers, the authorities, the cosmic powers of this present darkness... we must therefore recognise the evil design that perpetuates division and marginalisation and while supporting the government, be constructively critical of its policy and implementation if they are against honouring the command of God to embrace one another in love and care in today's challenging times, if we truly hope for a just future. May God help us do his will for our nation and for God's people on earth. Amen! Blessings!! Rev. Prashant.
