Acknowledgement of Country

From time immemorial the Wurundjeri people have cared for this land, nurtured it, depended on it and given honour and thanks to the Creator. Readings

The first reading is from the book of Jeremiah 31. 31-34;

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD,' for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Hear the Word of the Lord Thanks be to God

Psalm 119. 9-16; said by alternate half verses;

9 How shall the young keep their path pure:

unless they hold to your word?

10 I have sought you with my whole heart:

let me not stray from your commandments.

11 I have treasured your words in my heart;

that I might not sin against you.

12 Blessèd are you, Lord God;

O teach me your statutes.

13 With my lips I have been telling; all the judgements of your mouth.

14 And I find more joy in the way of your commands;

than in all manner of riches.

15 I will meditate on your precepts;

and give heed to your ways.

16 For my delight is wholly in your statutes;

and I will not forget your word.

The second reading is from the letter to the Hebrews 5. 5-14;

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you'; as he says also in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.' In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek. About this we have much to say that is hard to explain, since you have become dull in understanding. For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic elements

of the oracles of God. You need milk, not solid food; for everyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is unskilled in the word of righteousness. But solid food is for the mature, for those whose faculties have been trained by practice to distinguish good from evil.

Hear the Word of the Lord Thanks be to God

The Lord be with you; and also with you The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John 12. 20-33; Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour. 'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say - "Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

Faith Matters!! Letting people see Jesus!

Who is it that you would like to see? In my life I have always felt drawn to seeing religious figures and meeting them. I briefly met the Dalai Lama when he went to his residence in Sydney. His residence was across the road from a friend of mine who knew the community and was able to introduce me. I also was able to see Pope John Paul II who came for World Youth Day in 1986. As I was in Yr 12, our school was with a number of other schools lining the path that he would travel. The most vivid memory we had was that when he looked into the crowd everyone felt he was looking at them. It was uncanny how he had the gift to do this! Both of these were fleeting moments but they were very impactful for me and were the result of others leading me to meet them.

In today's gospel the Greeks come to see Jesus who is already impacting their lives through what people share about Him and His teachings. People from outside the Jewish nation recognise that he is not just the King of the Jews, but the King of Kings over all the nations. Yet it is interesting that to meet Jesus, Philip went to Andrew and Andrew went to Jesus. They were able to meet Jesus because someone who knew Jesus was able to introduce them to Him. The genius of John's gospel is that those who know Jesus are the ones that introduce others to Jesus.

As disciples, we introduce people to Jesus by our thoughts, words and deed. There are instances where Jesus let's people see Him by His own sovereign desire. Jesus can let anyone He chooses see Him, but generally the process of meeting Jesus for seekers comes through us and the way we introduce Jesus to those who are around us? When a seeker comes to our congregation to find Jesus, what are we showing them? What are we telling them? How are we living our parish life so that others can find Christ in our midst? The research shows that the biggest facilitator of church growth is that when people come to worship with a community, that they can see the gospel working in those that are worshipping. Parishes that are outward looking and giving people the opportunity to live out the gospel allow people to see Jesus and they maintain a Christlike presence. Giving people the opportunity to live missionally allows them to see Jesus where he is at, with those who we serve in the parish - the hungry, sick and poor.

For those who are convicted and worshipping, we need to make sure that we make time to see Jesus. We need to constantly see Jesus through scripture and prayer. We need to see the face of Jesus in those we love as well as those that are our enemies. We need to see the face of Jesus in everyone that comes to us at Foodbank and participates in our Pay What You Can Ministry. I encourage you to keep pushing things that do not serve your relationship with God or strengthen your faith to one side, and keep your eyes fixed on the cross so that you know your purpose and have God's strength to do it. If we can't see Jesus, how can we help the seeker meet Jesus when they come to us? Blessings, Rev. Rob.
