## Readings

#### The first reading is from the Acts of the Apostles 10:34-43;

Peter began to speak to those assembled in the house of Cornelius. 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ – he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; 40 but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Hear the Word of the Lord Thanks be to God

Psalm 118. 1-2, 14-24; said by alternate half verses; 1 O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good: his mercy endures for ever. 2 Let Israel now proclaim. that his mercy endures for ever. 14 The Lord is my strength and my song, and has become my salvation. 15 The sounds of joy and deliverance; are in the tents of the righteous: 16 The right hand of the Lord does mighty things; the right hand of the Lord raises up. 17 I shall not die, but live, and proclaim the works of the Lord. 18 The Lord has disciplined me hard; but he has not given me over to death. Open me the gates of righteousness; 19 and I will enter and give thanks to the Lord. 20 This is the gate of the Lord: the righteous shall enter it. 21 I will give praise you, for you answered me and have become my salvation. 22 The stone that the builders rejected: has become the head of the corner. 23 This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes.

#### 24 This is the day that the Lord has made; Let us rejoice and be glad in it.

The second reading is from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians 15. 1-11; I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you – unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them – though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

#### The Lord be with you; and also with you

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark 16:1-8; Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, 'Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?' When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, 'Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.' So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid. And all that had been commanded them they told briefly to those around Peter. And afterwards Jesus himself sent out through them, from east to west, the sacred and imperishable proclamation of eternal salvation.

# Faith Matters!! Intentional actions of faith on our part.

We read today that the women go to a place of death with bags full of spices at the break of dawn. They are thinking how will they roll away the stone, but as they near the tomb they see that someone has already taken care of this for them. They rush in and have an unexpected encounter with a white robed man that leaves them wondering. Everything around them says death, so they come to the tomb, expecting death. But they are met instead with an empty tomb and a word about resurrection. They are told to witness the empty place where Jesus' body has been. Their Easter experience is not too much different from ours.

Today we read how unsettling the word of resurrection is for them. The hope of the resurrection does not emerge instantly. Their first response is grounded in confusion. These sisters don't just believe that Jesus died; they watched it, they lived it, they are still mourning.

How can the sister's arrive at the tomb and not leave with a new belief? How seriously do we take the word resurrection? Do we say it as if it is the norm more than the exception? What was disorienting for the sisters should cause us disorientation as well. Is the single most constant reality of life— death—no longer a constant? Do we tremble at this realisation? Do we sit in the awe and fear of our risen Lord that He was able to overcome this reality of life? What does it take to move past that trembling, to believe the unbelievable? And what if believing isn't enough?

If we really believe in this resurrection, we must believe it down to our very bones. You can't halfway believe in resurrection; it either happened or it didn't. If we really believe that he got up, then that belief transforms each day: who we are and what we do has to be different. Belief in the resurrection changes our very existence. During Holy Week we viewed Jesus intentional actions of service, love and sacrifice. As we move through the Easter season we will be exploring our intentional actions of faith through service, love and sacrifice. Blessings, Rev. Rob.
