Readings

Deuteronomy 26. 1–11;

Moses spoke to the people, saying: When you have come into the land that the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, you shall make this response before the LORD your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the LORD heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me.' You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house.



DAILY DEVOTIONAL & GROUP REFLECTION

Lent began with Ash Wednesday, on 6th March. What would you say to someone who asked, 'What is Lent?' The simple response is that it is a season of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self examination and reflection. It is the forty days, counting Sundays, that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. However, I think Lent invites us to so much more.

This year I am inviting everyone in the parish to undertake a daily lenten devotion or study. There are numerous devotionals available but I have chosen 'The Sanctuary for Lent' by Juan Huertas. 
An Armchair Pilgrimage - A Lenten Reflection


- 1 Those who dwell in the shelter of the Most High,

Romans 10. 8b-13;

What does scripture say? 'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart' (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

GOSPEL Luke 4. 1–13:

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone." Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him." Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you," and "On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone." Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.



1st. SUNDAY IN LENT 10th. March 2018

PRACTICE GRATITUDE

Moving into the Season of Lent offers a different landscape after the growing confidence of Epiphany. The colours and mood change with the destination becoming more focused in our minds. The dust of the earth seems a little foreign, indeed even alien, for this is land through which we do not always choose to travel.

Focus scripture

There are two ways to read **Deuteronomy 26:1–11**. One is to use it for power and possession, claiming a faith story that stamps our ownership on the land we want because "God has given it to us." The alternative is to let the text remind us that all land we travel across is God's. God dwells in the land and the people of Israel who enter it are reminded of this: the land is God's and God dwells here. Yet this story has become part of a religious metanarrative (a narrative about a narrative) to prove particular land has been given to particular people. It is in the background of the Palestine/Israel conflict, and the many places where invading cultures have tried to claim that their God has given them the land, which the original inhabitants believed belongs to all. The text however does not necessarily allow that claim. The description of an offering from the land may have been a one-off event, or an annual ritual. "First fruits" giving reflects an ancient tradition that the land and its produce belong to God. Those who live in the land have a responsibility to share that gift with others, and preserve it for future generations. God's gifts are universal. If this was an annual offering then the lesson is for each generation to remind itself of the gifts God has given, not for possession but as a place to live, a place that offers life, a place that shapes the reign of God as a just sharing of the gifts of God. The wilderness journey of Lent calls us to the one place where all belong, the Commonwealth of God.

Psalm 91:1–2, 9–16 asserts that we find our true dwelling place in God who is our refuge and strength. But before we feel this is just another piece of selfish theology, we can read it against those other passages that invite us to break out of a "just for us" or "chosen few" theology and bring it into a more universal context. This is the very point **Romans 10:8b–13** makes when it claims there is no distinction between Jew and Greek (10:12). Yet even here some who write our theology can't help themselves but put exclusive clauses into Christian doctrine.

When we meet Jesus in the wilderness in **Luke 4:1–13** we find ourselves once more in no one's land, and learn from Jesus' experience whom to trust. It is a place of wilderness and we can choose whom to serve. It is our choice this Lenten time. Choose wisely.

Lent is about choices, either to put down roots, or to journey. This is not just a practical question but a theological one – to push our doctrinal roots into a land and claim who is in and who is out, or to let ourselves wander through the land, knowing the only one who ultimately owns anything is the God who created all and who calls us to journey and travel as foreigners in a new land, trusting the one who guides us and calls us through. What might be some practices or rituals of gratitude in response to all God gives and provides?

REFLECTION

Travelling God, as we leave what is familiar and find ourselves moving through a wilderness land, may we gather as a community of trust, and set out, holding to your call, your longing and your love that will bring us through. Amen.
