ADVENT REFLECTION - from Anglican Overseas Aid

In the 2016 Census, 30% of Australians claimed 'no Religion'; in 1966 it was only 0.8%. Increasingly, 'God bothering' is viewed with strangeness and suspicion.

Despite this, the Christmas story, with its curious mix of the 'everyday' and the Transcendent, still appeals to many Australians. On the one hand there is the donkey, the inn, and the lowly shepherds in the field. On the other hand there are angels, and stars, and startling personal revelations.

It's not a choice between ordinary and otherworldly.

Christmas is about God's extraordinary provision being found in the midst of the ordinary. That's what incarnation is about. At Christmas we celebrate that God has come among us.

PRAY:

Ask God to remind us every day about his provision and presence with us.

- 5 In you have I hoped all the day long. because of your goodness, O Lord.
- 6 Call to mind your compassion and your loving-kindness; for they are from of old.
- 7 Remember not the sins of my youth nor my transgressions; but according to your mercy think on me.
- 8 Good and upright is the Lord;
 - therefore will he direct sinners in the way.
- 9 The meek he will guide in the path of justice; and teach the humble his ways.
- 10 All the paths of the Lord are faithful and true; for those who keep his covenant and his commandments.

1 Thessalonians 3. 9-13;

How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith. Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you. And may he so strengthen your hearts in holiness that you may be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.

GOSPEL Luke 21, 25-36:

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on the earth distress among nations confused by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in a cloud" with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, stand up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near.' Then he told them a parable: 'Look at the fig tree and all the trees; as soon as they sprout leaves you can see for yourselves and know that summer is already near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that the kingdom of God is near. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. Be on guard so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and that day catch you unexpectedly, like a trap. For it will come upon all who live on the face of the whole earth. Be alert at all times, praying that you may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man.'



ADVENT 1 2nd. December 2018

SIGN OF THINGS TO COME

God's steadfast love invites us to enter Advent by trusting and living out the realm Jesus proclaims. Prophets declare earth and heaven are astir with signs of a new day to come. The signs of God's nearness and "here-ness" summon us to balance our longing for God's coming day with faithful action in this day and to trust that God provides the way forward.

Focus Scripture

Luke 21:25–38; The timing of this passage in Luke is Jesus' final week in Jerusalem. The setting is the temple. For the community to whom Luke wrote, the prediction of the temple's destruction in verse 5 was an accomplished fact – the failed Zealot rebellion led to the destruction of the temple by the Romans in 70 CE.

This passage comes near the end of two chapters where Luke recounts several temple encounters. Chapter 21 includes an extended narrative of Jesus' teaching about signs of things to come, with references from Hebrew prophets that serve to link Jesus' teachings with Jewish hopes for the future. The imagery of verses 25–26 presents a worldview that seems devoid of hope. The signs suggest upheaval across creation. Earth and heaven will show distress. The nations will be confused. "Fear and foreboding" form an understandable response to such crises. But between the lines and through the Hebrew Scripture references, another word is affirmed. The future will bring fulfillment of God's purposes. The parable of the fig tree "and all the trees" provides further assurance that new life approaches. "These things" (v. 31), to which the earlier signs point, reveal the nearness of God's reign.

For Jesus' listeners and Luke's community, that nearness evokes trust in God's promised redemption (liberation from bondage). The context of the Hebrew Scriptures used here helps to explain why Jesus links these otherwise troubling signs to the day when God's promise of redemption will be accomplished finally and fully. Verses 25-26 draw on several prophetic texts. Among them is Joel 2:30, with its "portents in the heavens and on the earth." Jesus' listeners and Luke's community would have been aware of what precedes this passage: Joel 2:28-29 promises the outpouring of God's Spirit "on all flesh." The wider context behind Jesus' reference to the "Son of Man" offers another clue for hope. That title comes from the book of Daniel, where a coming "Son of Man" will bring in the day of God's dominion. The gospel passage closes with a strong ethical appeal to Jesus' followers. "Be on quard" and "be alert" call for an attitude of readiness in the midst of chaotic times. Such vigilance in behaviour grows out of an outlook of hopeful expectation. The call to prayer in verse 36 invites trust of God, in whose hands the future rests secure. Such trust empowers us to risk living the ways of Jesus. God's promises provide the way for us to stand firm and act with hope.

This theme - key in Luke - also is addressed in the additional readings. Jeremiah 33:14-16 declares the coming of God's new day. Those days will fulfill promises made of a "righteous branch," who will bring justice in the land. Those hopes for justice in a coming day encourage our words and acts of justice today. Psalm 25:1-10 speaks of the way God provides for us through acts of mercy and love. God's actions teach and lead us in making those ways our own.

1 Thessalonians 3:9–13 offers the blessing of God's presence for days yet to come. Its closing benediction joins the love we have received with the strength God provides for our living.

The power of God breaks open the present to a future gifted with hope. What signs of God's realm do you see here and now? What promises of God's realm seem yet to be fulfilled? What might you and your church do this Advent to be signs of God's presence and promise to others?

REFLECTION

Help us, O God, to discern the signs of our times with trust and hope. When everything seems confused. may we stand firm in your purpose and mercy. When nothing seems to change, may we move freely toward the coming of new days and new ways. Amen.
