### A Hand Up, Not a Hand Out

Reflection - Christ the Gatherer and Love -

There's a subtle but important difference between hoarding and gathering. Jesus was certainly not a hoarder, but he was a gatherer in an important sense. Families often gather at Christmas, and the drawcard is love, and a sense of belonging - community rather than isolation. That is surely what Assala, a Syrian mother, now living in a refugee camp in Jordan with her husband and son, along with many other refugees, experienced through the support they have received through the Christmas Bowl. It was not so much a hand-out, as it was assistance to enable Assala and people like her to remain strong in their difficult situation. Their problems have not gone away, but they gain a new perspective in knowing they are not alone, the love of God is shared through the Christmas Bowl.

Marty Haugen's 1983 song affirms that 'Here in this place, new light is streaming,' and prays 'Gather us in the lost and forsaken, the blind and the lame, the young, and the old' and concludes with 'Give us to drink the wine of compassion . W can share the love and compassion through giving to the Christmas Bowl.

#### **ANGLICAN OVERSEAS AID**

#### Christmas stands as a grand statement from God of his love for us.

It is the most bold, wonderful and hopeful statement of all. God never gave up on us and was willing to do whatever was necessary to reconcile us to him.

#### "We love because he first loved us" (1 John 4:19)

As followers of Christ, we have the privilege of loving others because we understand that God first loved us. We are inherently loved and worthy to God, no matter what has happened to us in life, or what we have done. Nothing can ever change that, which is why Christmas is so joyous.

But we also know that Christmas is not always merry for a lot of people. Often the poor are poorer and the lonely are lonelier. This is why at Christmas, the time when God's love for us is celebrated, it is important to remember that Jesus also commanded us to love our neighbours. This is really what we are born to do. And for Jesus, it is the poor and outcast that his heart aches for. That is why our <u>Christmas Appeal</u> this year is based on the passage from Matthew 25, in which Jesus identifies so closely with the poor that whenever we care for them, we are actually caring for him (more info on our Christmas Appeal below).

So whether your Christmas is shaping up to be merry or not, our prayer for you is that it is meaningful and you know anew the wonderful love that God has for you.

#### Hebrews 10. 5-10;

When Christ came into the world, he said, 'Sacrifices and offerings you have not desired, but a body you have prepared for me; in burnt-offerings and sin-offerings you have taken no pleasure. Then I said, "See, God, I have come to do your will, O God" (in the scroll of the book, it is written of me).' When Christ said, 'You have neither desired nor taken pleasure in sacrifices and offerings and burnt offerings and sin offerings' (these are offered according to the law), then he added, 'See, I have come to do your will.' He abolishes the first in order to establish the second. And it is by God's will that we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all.

#### Luke 1. 39-45.:

Mary set out and went with haste to a Judean town in the hill country, where she entered the house of Zechariah and greeted Elizabeth. When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit and exclaimed with a loud cry, 'Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And why has this happened to me, that the mother of my Lord comes to me? For as soon as I heard the sound of your greeting, the child in my womb leapt for joy. And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfilment of what was spoken to her by the Lord.'

#### ADVENT 4 23rd. December 2018

#### **MOVING WITH MARY'S SONG**

Mothers and prophets, psalmists and seers, sing praises and seek to do God's will. Words old and new lift up promises fulfilled and promises awaited. The blessedness of trust in God partners with joyful hopes in God's justice and peace. In that joining, we are invited to move with Mary's song as we celebrate God's power coming to us and to all through her child.

Luke 1:39–45, (46–55) The first half of Luke 1 tells stories of promised birth. Zechariah balks when he is told his wife Elizabeth will bear a child. Six months later her relative Mary receives news of a child promised to her. The focus scripture recounts the meeting of these two women after Mary journeys from Nazareth to Judea.

Elizabeth greets Mary with three blessings. The first ("blessed are you among women") quotes a blessing bestowed on two other women in Israel's tradition. Jael and Judith received this blessing for an act of the sword (Judges 5:24–26; Book of Judith 13:6–8, 18). Ironically, Simeon will later tell Mary that "a sword will pierce your own soul" after his blessing of the child (Luke 2:35). The second ("blessed is the fruit of your womb") extends Elizabeth's blessing to Mary's child. The third blessing ("blessed is she who believed") is the most unique of all. Mary believes God will fulfill the promises spoken to her. Her trust then leads her to act accordingly as God's servant. Mary's enacted trust in God makes her the first "disciple" in Luke.

The song of Mary that begins with verse 46 closely parallels the song of Hannah in 1 Samuel 2:1–10. Both songs grow out of the birth of a promised child. Both songs praise God for new ways that fulfill ancient traditions of covenant. Both songs celebrate God's actions for the poor and vulnerable. Like these songs, Luke's gospel celebrates the God who comes to do justice and exercise mercy. Those who are lowly will be lifted up; those who are haughty will be brought low. Such reversals, sung by these women, will be revealed in Jesus' ministry. A Samaritan will serve as the example of neighbour (10:25–37). Women will exercise ministry (8:1–3). Prodigals and stay-at-homes alike will be embraced by love (15:11–32). Luke's Beatitudes (6:20–26) link Jesus' teachings with his mother's song.

Mary calls God "Saviour." Only one other verse in Luke uses this title. Shepherds are told in Luke 2:11 of the birth of a Saviour. Several inscriptions from this era bestow the title of "saviour" on the Roman emperor Augustus – one even declares him "saviour of the world." This gospel, in contrast, places "saviour" in Mary's song and in the angel's news "for all the people." In doing so, Luke addresses his community with a subtle word of resistance. In an empire that pressed for worship of the emperor, Luke avowed that Saviour is a title that belongs to God. Mary sings a revolutionary song to a God who comes to save.

The theme of shepherds – leaders – who seek justice for and from their flocks moves through the other texts as in Mary's song. Micah 5:2–5a points to hopes of a just ruler and rule whose ways will bring God's shalom. Psalm 80:1–7 sings its plea for God to save and restore. Hebrews 10:5–10 opens with references from Isaiah 1 that speak on the surface of empty ritual. But between those quoted lines stands the command that Isaiah announced: "Learn to do good, seek justice" (Isaiah 1:17). In other words, live out the message of Mary's song.

. . . .

Advent preparations draw to a close on this last Sunday in the season. Or do they only now begin? The child whose birth we prepare to celebrate comes to change everything – and us – for the good. In what ways might Mary's song be moving us to trust, to go, and to do? What words or activities, what rituals or projects, have helped Mary's ancient song take on new life for you in this season?

#### REFLECTION

Teach us to sing your praise, O God.

Teach us to sing with notes formed by hopes and acts of justice.

Teach us to sing with harmonies shaped by mercy's wide embrace.

Teach us to sing Mary's song of birth and rebirth for all creation in Jesus Christ. Amen.

#### Archbishop's Philip Freier's Christmas Message 2018

A service celebrating multicultural Melbourne at St Paul's Cathedral late last month was a marvellous event. There were people from almost every continent: joyful, laughing, listening, dancing, singing and eating together. What a delight!

The Cathedral was alive with colour, sound and movement. It highlighted what we can be together, in service of God and each other. As Saint Peter told those gathered at the home of the Roman Centurion, Cornelius: "God does not show favouritism but accepts from every nation the one who fears him and does what is right."

That night in Cornelius' home was a time of joy, like the multicultural service at the Cathedral. That sort of joy, which flows from the One who came as a baby born in Bethlehem, brings hope of peace, hope of dreams fulfilled.

It is a joy that transcends the painful circumstances in which so many people find themselves. Recently I was in Amman, Jordan, in the midst of the terrible tensions wracking the Middle East, and yet I saw and heard the joy of God's people.

Christmas is a time for joy and peace. Yes, it can be sentimentalised, trivialised by all the busyness and commercialisation of what should be a simple celebration, and it can be challenged by the pace, pressures and pain of ordinary life. But reflecting on Jesus Christ and how he fulfilled the promises of God is inspiring.

Christmas cards speak of joy and peace. Christmas carols sing of joy and peace: joy and peace in the birth of a baby in a land troubled then as now.

Mary, the mother of Jesus, trusted in God and his promises. Luke's Gospel tells us that she treasured up these things in her heart and pondered them. Perhaps she glimpsed what we can glimpse this side of Jesus' birth, death and resurrection: a vision of a world restored, made whole. As the famous carol puts it:

Peace on earth and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled! Joyful, all ye nations, rise, Join the triumph of the skies; With the angelic host proclaim Christ is born in Bethlehem!

Have a happy and joyous Christmas.
