1 Corinthians 12. 1 – 11;

Concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed. You know that when you were pagans, you were enticed and led astray to idols that could not speak. Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says 'Let Jesus be cursed!' and no one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit. Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

GOSPEL John 2. 1-11;

There was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.



SECOND SUNDAY after EPIPHANY 20th. January 2019 SIGNS OF CELEBRATION

In both the Hebrew Scriptures and the New Testament we find evidence of God's love for the people being shown through signs and miracles. The image of marriage is used to describe the covenant relationship between Creator and humankind. The relationship is grounded deeply in God's love, and demonstrated clearly through the exercise of spiritual gifts.

Focus scripture:

John 2:1–11 The first miracle reported in the gospel of John occurred at Cana of Galilee in gentile territory. John used the word "sign" rather than "miracle" to reinforce his belief that signs demonstrate faith and faith glorifies God. John describes signs as emerging from God's will and not from someone's need or want. A sign, then, points to something other than itself. Weddings are common metaphors for God's reign in scripture, such as in Isaiah 62:5. It seems fitting that Jesus' first sign should occur at a wedding. Jesus, some disciples, and Jesus' mother attended a wedding at which the supply of wine gave out. Weddings of the era were typically happy, festive, and long sometimes a week or more. To run out of wine at a wedding would result in humiliation for the groom's family in the "shame culture" of the day. If Jesus' mother were a kinswoman of the groom, the shame would extend to her and to her son. Maybe she was not a family member at all, but a loyal friend. In any case, she approached her son with the request to fix the situation. Jesus' initial response was to question the request's validity: "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me?" Her response to the question was to direct the household servants to do whatever Jesus tells them. While Jesus' use of "woman" in his guestion might sound harsh, it may only be a way of stepping back from the request. His mother does not seem offended. Jesus instructs the servants to fill with water six empty Jewish ceremonial washing jars that stood empty. Each jar held somewhere around 100 litres/25 gallons of water. Hebrew law required various ceremonial cleansings before eating. The servants obeyed and Jesus acted. Water was turned into wine - the best wine at the feast, abundant quantities of wine. Wine was the normal beverage at meals and festivals. Wine is the symbol of the joyous arrival of God's new age. The disciples believed that the glorious act they saw was a sign. This sign differs from Jesus' typical miracles which generally happened in public places, in plain sight. We are left wondering if the guests ever knew there was a miracle happening.

Isaiah 62:1–5 describes God's "kin-dom." It compares Israel's future joy to a wedding celebration in which a bridegroom rejoices over his bride. Psalm 36:5–10 is a hymn of praise for God's attributes. In the brief passage God is described as extending steadfast love, faithfulness, righteousness, judgment, refuge, abundance, delight, and salvation. The gifts are described as being for humans and animals; they bring abundance to one's house.

The reading from **1 Corinthians 12:1–11** attests to the abundance of spirit-given gifts and services provided to followers of the Christ. The author reminds us that each follower has a specific set of gifts which differ from others, and that these gifts are poured out upon all for the sake of the common good, not for individual desires. Different gifts are associated with different manifestations of God. Only the Spirit activates the gift.

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This week's readings invite us to trust in the God, revealed in the Christ, who provides abundantly for life's needs. Where, and in what ways, have you experienced the extravagance of God's love for you and all creation? How might you celebrate God's extravagant love this week

REFLECTION

We have heard of your great works, creating God, and of the miracles and signs that were part of Jesus' life.

May we, as part of your creation, be attuned to the signs and miracles of our times. Amen.
