the command of the Lord is true, and makes wise the simple.

8 The precepts of the Lord are right, and rejoice the heart;

the commandment of the Lord is pure and gives light to the eyes.

9 The fear of the Lord is clean and endures for ever;

the judgements of the Lord are unchanging, and righteous everyone.

- 10 More to be desired are they than gold, even much fine gold,
 - sweeter also than honey, than the honey that drips from the comb.
- 11 Moreover, by them is your servant taught;
 - and in keeping them there is great reward.
- 12 Who can know their own unwitting sins?
 - O cleanse me from my secret faults.
- 13 Keep your servant also from presumptuous sins, lest they get the mastery over me:

So I shall be clean, and innocent of great offence.

- 14 May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight,
 - O Lord, my strength and my redeemer.

James 3. 1-12:

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member. yet it boasts of great exploits. How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue - a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

GOSPEL Mark 8. 27–38;

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that I am?' And they answered him, 'John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets.' Jesus asked them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Peter answered him, 'You are the Messiah.' And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him. Then he

began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'



REFLECTION

Lord, when we feel your rebuke for our sins and our lack of faith, guide us back into what is right.

Shield us from betraying your purpose through fear and false judgement. Your ways are not our ways, but we pray that we may have grace to follow them. Amen.

To Introduce Myself

For the next three months, during the period covering Jo-Anne's Long Service and Annual leave, I will be your Locum Priest at St Matthew's and St Linus'.

Although we have had no previous connections to the area, my wife Ann and I look forward to getting to know you and the parish.

One connection is the Revd David Conolly, a dear friend, who was Assistant Curate here when the present Church was built in the days when the Revd Randall Deasey was Vicar. David has spoken of the pleasant memories he has of the parish community here in those days.

For my part I grew up in Sydney, studied Science (Mathematics) at Sydney

University and for the Ministry at Moore College, Sydney. My only visits to Victoria were to undergo two periods of training at Ballarat during National Service in the Royal Australian Air Force.

During my time at University I met Anglicans from outside Sydney and learnt from them that our Anglican Church was heir to traditions more catholic and liberal than the puritan evangelical religion predominant in the Sydney diocese.

Following ordination in 1960 I served a two year curacy at St Paul's Burwood before coming to Melbourne to be Assistant Chaplain at Trinity College.

Wanting to broaden and deepen my theological education I went to England where I studied at King's College in London University and acted as Anglican Chaplain for that lively institution the London School of Economics and Political Science.

While in London I met and married Ann who was also a Theology student at King's College.

Ann and I left England in 1969 when I was appointed Anglican Chaplain in the University of Melbourne. After eight years in this position I became Priest in Charge of St Mary's North Melbourne where we spent twenty one years. During these years Ann taught at Star of the Sea College, Brighton where she was Senior Studies Coordinator as well as teaching Senior English and Text and Traditions (formerly known as Biblical Studies).

After retirement in 1999 I began to assist at St Paul's Cathedral where I was made a Canon in 2010. I continued in this role until July this year when, in recognition of my long service, they made me a Canon Emeritus. Last week one of you asked "Do we call you Canon?" If you must, but I prefer Father Jim.

Ann and I have two grown up children. Sebastian lives in Montmorency and works in IT. Emma lives in New York and is a Lawyer. We have three grandchildren, all at Montmorency.

As Locum I have contracted to spend Sundays plus two days each week working for the parish. I will always be here on Wednesdays for the 10am Eucharist and for the rest of the day. The other day I shall make up by spending a whole day or two half days depending on parish events and clergy commitments.
