
#### 1 Corinthians 15. 35-38, 42-50;

Someone will ask, 'How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?' Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, 'The first man, Adam, became a living being'; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven. What I am saving, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

#### GOSPEL Luke 6. 27–38;

Jesus said to his disciples, 'I say to you that listen, Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who abuse you. If anyone strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also; and from anyone who takes away your coat do not withhold even your shirt. Give to everyone who begs from you; and if anyone takes away your goods, do not ask for them again. Do to others as you would have them do to you. If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. If you lend to

those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return. Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back.'



#### SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY

#### 24th. February 2019

The resurrection is central to Christianity, not just as a doctrine, but as a driving principle. Unfortunately, Paul's writing in this, ( 1 Corinthians 15. 35-38, 42-50) the earliest discussion of it, is dense and difficult, and some of the regular translations do not help. The key is Paul's contrast between perishable and imperishable. The seed and the plant are not an exact analogy for the old body and the new, but rather a way of demonstrating radical change within basic continuity.

The all-important claim is that 'God gives us a body' (v. 38) It is relevant to worry ( as did some of the early Fathers) about how God will reassemble the exact atoms and molecules of our present bodies. They are in any case in a constant state of flux, through which matter is shared, not hoarded.

Near a town in the state of Washington, millions of gallons of radioactive atomic wastes are being stored in huge underground tanks. The tanks have a life expectancy of 20 or 30 years. The wastes within them will remain deadly for about 600 years. We live in a society which, like those tanks in Washington, is trying to store up anger that sooner or later is going to break forth, causing pain and misery for many. We are all familiar with the popular bumper sticker in Dallas which reads, "I'm Mad Too, Eddie." The other day I saw one that said, "I'm Mad At Eddie." Basically, there are far too many hostile people going around looking for some way to unload their anger. Anger takes a tremendous toll on those about us: Eighty percent of all murders are committed by people who have some relationship with the victim. Somebody gets angry, there's a gun or knife handy. and tragedy results. According to hospital records, innumerable parents have inflicted serious injuries upon their small children in fits of temper. One authority estimates that 60,000 children a year in America are beaten to death, that more children under five years of age are killed by their parents than die of disease. Besides hurting others, anger is killing us. Suppressed anger and bitterness are eating away at our health and peace of mind:

Those years which Joseph spent in slavery and prison could have been the occasion for a slow burn that might have ignited into an explosion of anger at the sight of his brothers. How angry Joseph could have been with God for getting him into such a

situation. But Joseph recognized that God was with him in his sufferings and that these were from the loving hand of a sovereign God. Most of all, Joseph could have been Angry with his **b**rothers, who had callously sold him into slavery. The high point of Joseph's relationship with his brothers comes in **Genesis chapter 45**, for it is here that there is a reconciliation brought about between them. This was made possible on the brothers' part by their genuine repentance, regretting their sin with regard to Joseph, and reversing their actions when a similar situation was presented with regard to Benjamin. But on Joseph's part, reconciliation was achieved through his sincere and total forgiveness of his brothers for the evil they had committed against him. Let us, then, seek to learn the lessons on forgiveness which this chapter offers us.

But some man will say, How are the dead raised up?] We now proceed from the fact of the resurrection to its manner, a question which the Apostle discusses as far as <a href="1">1 Corinthians 15:54</a>, where he begins to treat of its result. and with what body do they come?] It was the doctrine of the Resurrection of the body which was the stumbling-block of many hearers of the Gospel. Estius remarks that the Pharisees taught that men would rise again with bodies possessing in every respect the same functions as those in which they were laid in the grave. This was a difficulty to many, especially to the Sadducees. See St Matthew 22:23-33. To remove these difficulties St Paul now explains the nature of the Resurrection body, and of the process whereby it is brought into being.

**LUKE 6:27-38;** It is natural to reciprocate—to help those who help you and hurt those who hurt you. "Do unto others as they do unto you" is simple justice, and has been enshrined in law at least since the Code of Hammurabi (18th Century B.C.), which specified an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. Reciprocity is a natural, common-sense way to order one's life, and is far more enlightened than the aggressive, selfish approach that many people favour today. "Do unto others as they do unto you" has morphed into "Do unto others *before* they do to you" and simply "Do unto others!" We live in a world where powerful and wealthy people use power and wealth to accumulate even more power and wealth—with little regard to the effects on other people. As a wealthy rancher is reputed to have said, "All I want is what's mine—and what adjoins it." In many circles, such aggressive behavior is not only condoned but is celebrated. In some cases, truly evil people deliberately inflict injury on others for no apparent reason. We can understand the person who would steal something of value. It is more difficult to understand a person who would set fire to a church because of racial hatred or shoot a passer-by for a quick thrill.

In such a dog-eat-dog world, reciprocity seems positively enlightened. It does not seek to inflict injury except in cases where injury is deserved. Its goal is fairness. The bad person suffers, and the good person prospers. It is as it should be.

And yet Jesus tells us that reciprocity is not kingdom behavior. Just as God goes beyond justice to mercy, we are to do the same. It is a hard lesson, one that goes against the grain. It is *un*-natural. We can move beyond justice to mercy, but only through the grace of God.

#### REFLECTION

Lord Jesus, you have given us an example of the perfect love that pardons and shows mercy, and in pity of our failures you have continually brought us back into the right way. Give us the strength of your tenderness, the power of your compassion, so that when we are tempted to anger, our response shall always be gentle and considerate. **Amen**
