Readings

Deuteronomy 26.1-11;

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you. O Lord, have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

Psalm 115. 1-7, 16-17;


- 1 Not to us, O LORD, not to us, but to your name give the glory,

2 Corinthians 8. 1-9;

We want you to know, brothers and sisters, about the grace of God that has been granted to the churches of Macedonia; for during a severe ordeal of affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means, begging us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in this ministry to the saints— and this, not merely as we expected; they gave themselves first to the Lord and, by the will of God, to us, so that we might urge Titus that, as he had already made a beginning, so he should also complete this generous undertaking among you. Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking.

Matthew 5. 21-24:

You have heard that it was said to those of ancient times, "You shall not murder"; and "whoever murders shall be liable to judgement." But I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgement; and if you insult a brother or sister, you will be liable to the council; and if you say, "You fool", you will be liable to the hell of fire. So when you are offering your gift at the altar, if you remember that your brother or sister has something against you, leave your gift there before the altar and go; first be reconciled to your brother or sister, and then come and offer your gift.



STEWARDSHIP 2

18th. AUGUST 2019

WE GIVE TO GOD

Focus scripture:

There are two ways to read **Deuteronomy 26:1–11.** One is to use it for power and possession, claiming a faith story that stamps our ownership on the land we want because "God has given it to us." The alternative is to let the text remind us that all land we travel across is God's. God dwells in the land and the people of Israel who enter it are reminded of this: the land is God's and God dwells here. Yet this story has become part of a religious metanarrative (a narrative about a narrative) to prove particular land has been given to particular people. It is in the background of the Palestine/Israel conflict, and the many places where invading cultures have tried to claim that their God has given them the land, which the original inhabitants believed belongs to all. The text however does not necessarily allow that claim. The description of an offering from the land may have been a one-off event, or an annual ritual. "First fruits" giving reflects an ancient tradition that the land and its produce belong to God. Those who live in the land have a responsibility to share that gift with others, and preserve it for future generations. God's gifts are universal. If this was an annual offering then the lesson is for each generation to remind itself of the gifts God has given, not for possession but as a place to live, a place that offers life, a place that shapes the reign of God as a just sharing of the gifts of God. The wilderness journey of Lent calls us to the one place where all belong, the Commonwealth of God.

Corinthians 8: 1-9; Paul speaks on behalf of another community's need for help and support. Urging the Corinthian community to put their faith into action for the sake of making whole another's need.

Matthew 5:21-24; Known for his puzzling parables, Jesus takes a more practical approach here as he addresses a crowd. He addresses the difficult topics of their daily lives and deepens the meanings they have for an ethical life. As he discusses anger, adultery, divorce and true speech Jesus is telling his audience not just how to act but how to be - be in the image of God. On first hearing, the rules Jesus sets out seem like stricter replacements for the commandments given in Deuteronomy, but at closer look they deconstruct mere actions of murder, retribution, betraval. abandonment, and lying into being symptoms of our hard-heartedness and refusal to be reconciled to each other. In holding up the vision of each person with hearts reconciled to God and one another. Jesus claims personhood for all parties involved. The judged and the judger are not bound in the past but together liable for the justice and reconciliation of the future. Adultery, thought as well as deed, challenges our tendency to treat others as objects rather than subjects. This idea, along with his coming down on the accepted practice of men divorcing their wives, furthers Jesus' campaign for the equal personhood of women. The lesson on oath-taking seeks not merely to get rid of an antiquated practice but to open our eyes to the insidiousness of our self-interest. We are either too concerned with being liked or accepted, or so unconcerned with the hearer of our words and the receiver of our pledges and vows that we do not take care in speaking words that are true, nor in making sure they stay true. Life is full of opportunities, especially for those living in an industrialized and technologized society, but options aren't the same as the choices we make that change the course of our lives

As we search to speak with more truth, to live with more integrity, and to seek reconciliation with neighbours and nations, it helps to know it is not ours alone to plumb the depths of the human heart and the heart of God. The spirit of God is unveiling the truth that lies at the heart of our matters in the words of Moses, the ministry of Jesus, the wrestling of the psalmists, the pastoral advice of Paul, and the interpreting of the Spirit itself.

REFLECTION

Explorer of our hearts, discerner of our souls, we invite you into the depths of our struggles.

We open the locked doors.

With words of love and the boldness of truth, we ask you to knock on the hardest places in our hearts and to soften them so that we may love you and love our neighbours. Amen.
