# 1 Cor 1: 21-31;

For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. <sup>25</sup>For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. Consider your own call, brothers and sisters:- not many of you were wise by human standards,- not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. <sup>27</sup>But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; <sup>28</sup>God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, <sup>29</sup>so that no one- might boast in the presence of God. <sup>30</sup>He is the source of your life in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God, and righteousness and sanctification and redemption, <sup>31</sup>in order that, as it is written, 'Let the one who boasts, boast in- the Lord.'

# Gospel: Luke 8:22-25

One day Jesus got into a boat with his disciples, and he said to them, 'Let us go across to the other side of the lake.' So they put out, and while they were sailing he fell asleep. A gale swept down on the lake, and the boat was filling with water, and they were in danger. They went to him and woke him up, shouting, 'Master, Master, we are perishing!' And he woke up and rebuked the wind and the raging waves; they ceased, and there was a calm. He said to them, 'Where is your faith?' They were afraid and amazed, and said to one another, 'Who then is this, that he commands even the winds and the water, and they obey him?'





#### Season of Creation STORM SUNDAY 15th. September 2019

Storm Sunday Creation imagines and reflects the divine characteristics of God. The ocean examines God's depths. The fauna and flora sing God's abundance. Today we celebrate the storm. Words do not capture the power of God in the way thunder, lightning and strong winds can. In the storm, we confront how divine wisdom is beyond what we can describe and explain. We ask ourselves how we might move with the patterns of the weather and the Spirit, and follow the wisdom that creates, sustains, and redeems creation

#### Focus scripture

**Psaim 29** When we talk about God, we often talk about the role God plays in our lives. Psalm 29 is thought to be one of the earliest psalms, perhaps adapted by a similar poem dedicated to the Canaanite storm god. Baal. It praises God who is omnipotent and demonstrates this in the way nature bends and breaks at the sound of God's voice. The book of Psalms as a whole offers many roles for God: creator, healer, provider, saviour, judge, protector. Divine balance and fullness are found in the book as a whole, as in the diversity of human experience over a lifetime. Psalm 29 challenges us in the midst of our fear, our pain, our celebration, not to forget that God is sovereign - "enthroned over the flood." This is difficult for modern readers to grasp; we observe floods and storms not just in our community but all over the world. At times, it seems recovery is just begun in one site when, across the globe, another place is hit. The sovereignty of God is important because it houses within it many other roles the psalms and Ancient Near Easterners experienced from the Divine: law -qiver, warrior-saviour, judge, shepherd, provider, protector. The Psalter as a whole describes God's throne as one welded from righteousness, mercy, justice, and faithful love. While an all-powerful monarch is problematic for modern readers, the values that made the enthronement of God a standard for Israelites should resonate with us, too, Psalm 29 honours the storm king, the lord of the flood. The poet lauds God's power to call creation to bow at divine presence and to contain the flood. The poet does not describe actual events but praises divine control over potential chaos; hence the praise rather than lament. Like thunder that calls us to attention and warns us to seek shelter, the voice of God contains the chaos. Wisdom is "the voice over many waters," (verse 3b). The waters of Psalm 104 fled from God's rebuke to settle into streams that nourished the valleys where creatures then thrived. The writer of Psalm 29 asks that the people be so strengthened and blessed by the God enthroned over the flood. The calf and ox may flee, the wilderness shake, the cedars

break and the oaks whirl; but even the branches that fall to the ground and the topsoil that is washed away will reveal and create new fertility for creation's regeneration, and call the creatures to heed the warning signals earlier and to create better shelters for future generations. It is through the harnessing of water that Job 28:20–27 attributes God's discovery and establishment of Wisdom's voice, asking the overarching question of the book, "Where then does wisdom come from?" The answer: "from the storm"(v. 23–27). As God sets limits on the atmosphere, the wind, the waters, the rain, and lightning that may push a storm into chaos, God discovers the mediating nature of Wisdom and sets the cycle of creation, placing Wisdom as an arbiter of proportion over the elements and creatures that can drive creation to extremes.

**1 Corinthians 1:21–31** looks back at the tradition of wisdom in the psalms and in Job and agrees with Job that the fullness of wisdom is hidden from human minds. Only God has the power to understand it and to find a place for it among us. With the incarnation, crucifixion, and resurrection, Jesus the Christ became "righteousness, sanctification, and redemption" for us but also "the wisdom of God" (v. 30). We see Jesus embody the power and wisdom of the creator in **Luke 8:22–25** as he "rebukes" the wind and waves back into their place.

Throughout the scriptures, we see God's people ask questions about Wisdom's source, role, and present location. God answers through the unleashing of creation's power and its harnessing, through the community's response to suffering in their midst, and with the powerful witness of Jesus the Christ. We see glimpses of divine wisdom, enough to hope in its enduring presence and path towards our redemption, but it is God's domain to know wisdom in its eternal fullness.

#### REFLECTION

O Wisdom, your power is unlimited and unceasing. Call us, wake us, bring our imaginations to and for life. Push us. Move us. Remove the barriers of our apathy and fill us with the courage to act with your guidance, and to trust in the wise and powerful Spirit that made and loved creation. Amen.
