## Isaiah 35. 1-10;

The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the LORD, the majesty of our God. Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, 'Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you.' Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert: the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveller, not even fools, shall go astray. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the LORD shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

## **Psalm 146:**

- 1 Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, O my soul; while I live I will praise the Lord.
- 2 While I have any being;

I will sing praizse to my God.

3 Put not your trust in princes;

nor in flesh and blood, which cannot save.

- 4 For when their breath goes from them, they return again to the earth; and on that day all their thoughts perish.
- 5 Blessed are those whose help is the God of Jacob;

whose hope is in the Lord their God.

6 The God who made heaven and earth;

the seas, and all that is in them.

7 Who keeps faith for ever;

who deals justice to those that are oppressed.

8 The Lord gives food to the hungry;

and sets the captives free.

9 The Lord gives sight to the blind;

the Lord lifts up those that are bowed down.

10 The Lord loves the righteous;

the Lord cares for the stranger in the land.

11 He upholds the widow and the fatherless;

as for the way of the wicked, he turns it upside down.

12 The Lord shall be king for ever;

your God, O Zion, shall reign through all generations. Praise the Lord.

## James 5, 7-10:

Be patient, beloved, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near. Beloved, do not grumble against one another, so that you may not be judged. See, the Judge is standing at the doors! As an example of suffering and patience, beloved, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

## Matthew 11. 2-11:

When John heard in prison what the Messiah was doing, he sent word by his disciples and said to Jesus, 'Are you the one who is to come, or are we to wait for another?' Jesus answered them, 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them. And blessed is anyone who takes no offence at me.' As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to look at? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? Someone dressed in soft robes? Look, those who wear soft robes are in royal palaces. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you." Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he.'



## **ADVENT 3**

## 15th. December 2019

Isaiah 35:1–10 tells of power reversals that mirror the Magnificat: the blind shall see, the deaf shall hear, the lame shall leap, the desert shall be watery. In interesting contrast to Isaiah 11:1-10, predator beasts are vanquished rather than reconciled. When John the baptizer asks for confirmation of Jesus' identity, Psalm 146 A Checklist for the Church: Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord. O my soul! We are to praise God, the psalmist tells us, because God is trustworthy and eternal. Then the psalmist reminds us that God gives care to the oppressed, the hungry, prisoners, the blind, the burdened, immigrants, those without financial resources. This is the Old Testament God. And this is what followers of God are called to do. God acts on earth through the people who are gathered to worship and to demonstrate God's power and love. Psalm 146 provides a checklist for each church congregation: What have we done to ensure that prisoners can be released? What have we done to prevent blindness--have we opened a eye-clinic in a poor community, have we helped to distribute glasses to people who can't afford them? What are we doing about immigrants? What attention are we paying to people whose families aren't able to care for them, or to people without family? This psalm begins by acclaiming praise for God and disdaining trust in powerful men. They won't last, God will. According to this psalm. God cares about the oppressed, the hungry, prisoners, the blind, immigrants, orphans, and widows. Jesus lived out this psalm. How is the church doing?

Matthew 11:2–11 reports actions of justice that serve as the witness to Jesus' identity.

**James 5:7–10** reminds us to wait, again with a prophetic reversal vision of the vulnerable made strong.

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The promise of coming power-reversals, the elated news of revolution among us, the model of how we might give ourselves to faith in a God who truly steers us towards liberation: Theologian Howard Thurman, African-American survivor of the segregated American south, saw in the Magnificat that "the hope of every generation, is in the birth of the child. The stirring of the child in the womb is the perennial sign of man's attack on bigotry, blindness, prejudice, greed, hate, and all the host of diseases that make of man's life a nightmare and a holocaust

O God, you are the closest and most familiar

Take this life narrowed by what is known
and open to me a new way of being.
