ACT for PEACE - CHRISTMAS BOWL

Bible Study Guide for Advent - Joy (Gaudate`)

The readings today reflect upon Promise, Preparation and Joy. Sometimes we get it all wrong! Promise and preparation are reduced to relatively trivial events of every day, while joy, surely has little to do with the troubles of our time.

But consider Mary's song (which is one of the readings for Advent 4) the Magnificat recorded in Luke ch. 1; Her joy is obvious and overflowing, but it is clearly related strongly to problems and injustices of every age. The reason for her rejoicing was not in what she herself might do, but in that which might be done by him who was to be born of her.

The earliest Church saw the Magnificat as the kind of salvation God wrought through Jesus. Then, as now, joy comes with engagement.

Let us ensure that the true meaning of God's coming in Christ is reflected in our lives throughout the year: and to that end, let us commit ourselves to God in the days that are to come in our Christmas preparation.

The Christmas Bowl is the Christmas appeal of Act for Peace, the International Aid Agency of the National Council of Churches in Australia.

Behold, God is my salvation:
I will trust and will not be afraid;
'For the Lord God is my strength and my song:
and has become my salvation.'
With joy you will draw water;
from the wells of salvation.'

'Give thanks to the Lord, call upon his name;

Philippians 4. 4-7;

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

GOSPEL Luke 3.7-18:

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.' And the crowds asked him. 'What then should we do?' In reply he said to them. 'Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise.' Even tax-collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, 'Teacher, what should we do?' He said to them. 'Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you.' Soldiers also asked him, 'And we, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages. As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.' So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

ADVENT 3 16th. December 2018

LOOK FORWARD

The scriptures for today, observed by some as Rejoice Sunday, invite all to find hope in relationship with God and move with God into another way of living. In our journey with God, questions lead into expectation and repentance leads into words and deeds of mercy and justice. God is near – today and in all the days to come. God rejoices over us – today and in all the days to come.

Luke 3:7–18; These verses continue John the Baptizer's exhortation in the wilderness around the Jordan River. John's location is significant. In the story of the exodus of the Hebrew people from Egypt, the time in the wilderness was a time of preparation and discovery. In the wilderness, John also is far from the temple and the palace of the Roman governor in Jerusalem. John's preaching calls those who have gathered to listen – both Jews and Gentiles – to turn from the ways of empire to follow a different sovereign.

John's words seem harsh. Vipers were a type of snake in the ancient world, some poisonous and some not. In scripture, viper is a metaphor for evil. "Brood of vipers" is John's way of describing the lifestyles of some who have come to listen to him.

Among the crowds gathered around John the Baptizer are two groups considered outcasts: tax collectors and soldiers. They often were held in disdain by first-century Jewish society as collaborators with the Roman forces. John's demanding call for living in God's ways is extended to them, as well.

John's cry for a renewed relationship with God is for all people. John challenges those who listen to repent, describing how repentance demands a change of life and heart evidenced in action as well as attitude. John associates repentance with "bear fruit," a synonym in Jewish wisdom literature for one's actions. John declares that one's character and behaviour are important indicators of faithfulness, more so than one's standing as an ancestor of Abraham.

John is careful to distinguish himself from the "one who is more powerful" – God's Messiah. John describes how a time of judgment will come with this One, likened to how a farmer of that time would use a winnowing fork – a hand tool like a large rake – to toss threshed grain in the air to separate the inedible chaff from the kernel. Each grain contains both chaff and kernel; each person is both holy and unholy. The invitation to repentance and God's promise to forgive transform this judgment into a word of good news for today and all the days to come.

The beneficiary of John's message is not just the Messiah whose way he prepares. The beneficiaries of repentance will be those provided with warm clothing or food. They will be those previously cheated or bullied. The Spirit works through acts of justice and compassion, as well as acts of refraining from injustice, to prepare the way for Messiah and a greater intimacy with God. John proclaimed the nearness of God and God's promised Messiah.

The words of **Philippians 4:4–7** invite the church to rejoice in God, whose peace shapes and guards our lives.

In Isaiah 12:2–6, the prophet declares that joy is to be found in "wells of salvation," freeing us to "shout aloud and sing for joy" as we tell of God's mighty works.

Zephaniah 3:14–20 rejoices in the hope of Jerusalem's restoration through the One who will "gather" Israel. Beyond that, verse 17 reveals that God rejoices

over us. Such joy at God's nearness helps us discern why the early church heard John's challenging message as good news.

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John the Baptizer bids us to look forward – to turn again to God and to Christ and re-orient our lives to the radical, justice-seeking ways of God's reign. When do you feel that you and your church have demonstrated openness to this challenge? What actions and attitudes might draw you into a closer relationship with God this Advent season?

REFLECTION

Show us the way, O God, to reshape our lives to reflect your reign of justice and peace. Open our hearts to rejoice in renewed relationships, and send your Spirit to help us find direction and purpose in all that each day brings. Amen.

PINK CANDLE

There is one Pink candle in the Advent Wreath.
It is lit on the Third Sunday in Advent.

Pink represents JOY.

This Sunday is sometimes called 'Gaudete' Sunday.

'Gaudete' means Rejoice.

We rejoice that our waiting for Jesus is more than half over.
