He still persists in his integrity, although you incited me against him, to destroy him for no reason.' Then Satan answered the LORD, 'Skin for skin! Hebrews 1.1-4: 2.5-12:

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets. but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. Now God did not subject the coming world, about which we are speaking, to angels. But someone has testified somewhere. What are human beings that you are mindful of them, or mortals, that you care for them? You have made them for a little while lower than the angels: you have crowned them with glory and honour, subjecting all things under their feet.' Now in subjecting all things to them. God left nothing outside their control. As it is, we do not yet see everything in subjection to them, but we do see Jesus, who for a little while was made lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honour because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone. It was fitting that God, for whom and through whom all things exist, in bringing many children to glory, should make the pioneer of their salvation perfect through sufferings. For the one who sanctifies and those who are sanctified all have one Father. For this reason Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters, saying, 'I will proclaim your name to my brothers and sisters, in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.'

GOSPEL Mark 10. 2–16:

Some Pharisees came, and to test Jesus they asked, 'Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife?' He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' They said, 'Moses allowed a man to write a certificate of dismissal and to divorce her.'

But Jesus said to them, 'Because of your hardness of heart he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation, "God made them male and female." "For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." So they are no longer two, but one flesh. Therefore what God has joined together, let no one separate.' Then in the house the disciples asked him again about this matter. Jesus said to them, 'Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; and if she divorces her husband and marries another, she commits adultery.' People were bringing little children to him in order that he might touch them; and the disciples spoke sternly to them. But when Jesus saw this, he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it.' And he took them up in his arms, laid his hands on them, and blessed them.

PENTECOST 20 7th, October 2018

BROKEN AND BLESSED

Today's readings challenge us. Does God really play with our lives, as the introduc-tion to Job suggests? Is lifelong marriage between a man and a woman the only option for living in God's realm? Perhaps, to paraphrase Hebrews, God perfects us through our imperfections. This week's readings can serve as examples and invitations.

Focus scripture

Mark 10:2–16; Several scripture passages can cause pain – inadvertently – and today's gospel reading falls into that category. The first part of this text (verses 2–12) has often been used as a strong affirmation of heterosexuality, and as a blunt statement that divorce is wrong and not to be tolerated. For those who are gay or lesbian, and for those who for any number of reasons are divorced (and possibly remarried) this can cause untold pain; beyond that, it is doubtful that that would be the point of the passage.

The reason given for the dialogue here has nothing to do with divorce. Rather, the question is asked (by the Pharisees) simply to test Jesus, and probably to coax Jesus into making a statement that would offend either them or their opponents, the Sadducees. Yet legal questions abound, and people have often inserted modern understandings and additional text in and amongst the verses.

The Pharisees' question is literally "is it permitted" and the correct answer is, "yes." However, divorce was in fact permitted to the extent that it was often undertaken without much thought. Given that women who were "unattached" to a man (father, husband, or son) were seen as social nobodies, divorce was often unjust.

Jesus points out that Moses permitted divorce because of people's "hardness of heart." In other words, we are not the ideals that God had intended and hoped for, and there are times that relationships simply fail. While Jesus states that "whatever God has joined together no one should separate" begs the further question, "If a relationship breaks down, was it in fact joined by God in the first place?" We simply do not know.

Similarly, Jesus also states a man commits adultery against his wife, and a woman can divorce a man. Except these are not pieces of Hebrew law – adultery was a

crime" against the man who possessed a wife, not against the wife herself; and there was no provision for a woman to divorce a man, suggesting that the second half of verse 16 is probably an addition to the original text. We also need to caution about inserting a modern understanding of marriage into a time when polygamy was permitted (this text does not ban polygamy, although it has been used to justify that) and marriage was first and foremost a business relationship, designed for mutual support and the raising of children. Marriage is viewed very differently today. These teachings of Jesus may have made sense at that time, but times have changed, and Jesus' teachings sound harsh to modern ears. What helps is to move beyond the particularities of marriage breakdown to compassionately acknowledge the more general reality of the many kinds of relationship breakdowns and injustices we both experience and are effected by us as human and earth family.

The concluding verses of the reading remind us of the importance of approaching faith – and life – with the joy, openness, and understanding of children, and we are left with an image of Jesus blessing the children, a powerful reminder of our own belovedness.

Both **Job 1:1, 2:1–10** and **Psalm 26** remind us of the struggle to remember who we are in the midst of the reality of life, and challenge us to remain faithful to who we really are.

Hebrews 1:1–4, 2:5–12 reminds us, too, of Jesus living out his integrity, and emphasizes that Jesus models God's care for all.

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Struggling with difficult readings does not mean we need to reject them, but simply to approach them with caution and enquiry. At the heart of these texts is the compassion of God for all, and the blessing of love. The call to approach God's world as children can enable us to strive harder in our dealings with others. How might we open ourselves to a more child-like embrace of God's reign? What might happen when we do that?

REFLECTION

God, sometimes we are confused and troubled. We know you are present in our lives, but sometimes that presence can seem elusive or even troublesome. Remind us that you are here no matter what, and that you love us no matter what. Amen.
